

#### **Generally Assembled**

Between Friday 6<sup>th</sup> and Monday 9<sup>th</sup> July people from all over the United Reformed Church will be gathering in Nottingham for General Assembly (GA). Some will be going as they serve the denomination in some way, others as invited guests and the vast majority will be elders and ministers from local churches throughout the UK. The purpose of General Assembly is the biennial assembly of the United Reformed Church, meeting every two years to celebrate, discuss, and make decisions on, the life and work of the denomination.

I will be attending this year as a visitor. A non-voting member, with a specific task. Two years ago, when GA met in Southport, an elder from a nearby URC was elected as one of the two Moderators. Following this Mr Derek Estill asked me to support him as his chaplain. This is a very non-specific role, but mainly means being supportive and helping to share worship within the denomination's meetings. So, over the four days I will be participating in the opening worship and induction, morning and evening devotions, a Sunday service and closing worship. This has been prepared in collaboration with others to agree the readings and hymns, and parts I have structured and written. As well as all these preparations, when Derek is chairing sessions I'll be sat alongside him being supportive.



When I agreed to be his chaplain, I had very little idea of what lay ahead and the majority of it I could not have predicted. This is the beginning of two years where Derek, alongside Rev'd Nigel Uden, will be serving in a significant leadership role within our denomination and I, and every member of the URC, has a part to play in supporting them through it.

The theme of GA is mirroring the emphasis of the whole denomination: Walking the Way, living the life of Jesus today. While GA meets you will be able to watch proceeding over the

internet and afterwards the resources we have prepared will be available to us. For me it will probably be a very stressful weekend, but hopefully it will serve to inspire and enable our denomination as we move forward.



**37 Days** Drama revealing the complex behind-closed-doors story of the final weeks before the outbreak of World War I. ( $3 \times 1$  hour episodes)

The Last Day of World War One Michael Palin tells the story of how soldiers continued to be killed in battle for many hours after the armistice had been signed. (1 hour)

**The Passing Bells** In this drama at the outbreak of war, two teenage boys - one German and one British - defy their parents to sign up. (5 x 30 min episodes)

Armistice - The End Game of World War One David Reynolds takes a fresh look at the extraordinary events and personalities involved in the Armistice. (1 hour)

**Long Shadow** David Reynolds traces the legacy of the Great War examining how the war haunted a generation and shaped the peace that followed. (3 x 1 hour episodes)


#### **Mission Statement and Plan for Grays URC**

After a series of discussions Grays United Reformed Church, gathered as church meeting on Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> July 2018, agreed the following:

#### 1. Mission Statement

A place to pause, and then step forward.

#### 2. Logo



#### 3. Mission Plan

- 1. to explore ways of deepening our faith, through bible study/house group, as well as corporate worship.
- 2. to build our fellowship by further engaging with building users and the community, including other local churches.
- 3. and while acknowledging that many in our fellowship prefer traditional worship, after thoughtful discussion we are experimenting with less traditional styles, with a view to bringing the Word to a wider audience.

#### Initial questions for further reflection:

- 1. How can we make ourselves more accessible and known?
- 2. How can we develop our space and what we already do, to better enable people to 'pause'?
- 3. What do we need to explore to help people pause, but then be able to step forward in ways that draw them towards, or help build, the kingdom of God?

Following on from our Church discussion about the Mission Statement, we began a conversation about the kind of church we think we are. We know we are a United Reformed Church, with a Congregational heritage, but whilst that may be understood by fellow churchgoers, it may not mean much to people with no church experience. Three statements were mentioned in the meeting and we offer them here for us to reflect upon over the summer.

Firstly, a statement from St Leonard's Church, Hythe, Kent:-

- You are welcome whatever your beliefs, even if you find organised religion irrelevant
- You are welcome whatever your lifestyle & sexuality
- You are welcome wherever you may be on your faith journey: believer or agnostic, conventional Christian or questioning sceptic
- You are welcome as an equal partner, and we look forward to the ideas and experiences that you can bring
- We welcome the variety of ways in which human beings have explored the sacred, and have no wish to promote just one approach to Christianity
- We think that the way we treat one another is far more important than the beliefs we hold
- We think that it is vital to take seriously the intellectual problems which many people have with Christianity, and encourage ways of understanding religion which feed the mind as well as the soul
- We think that religion must be concerned with injustice and suffering and see ourselves as a community helping to build a better world, bringing hope to those Jesus called the least of his sisters and brothers
- We recognise that our ignorance is always going to exceed our understanding and find more grace in the search for meaning than in the claim for certainty
- We recognise that our faith entails costly discipleship and conscientious resistance of evil, as has always been the tradition of the Church.

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Secondly, a statement from the leaflets that were supplied as part of Back to Church Sunday:-

#### What do you think of when you think of Church?

Maybe an old stone building. Or old ladies warbling hymns with 25 verses and no book. Or a bunch of morally superior, smartly dressed people who seem to have it all together (but probably behave as badly as everyone else in secret).

Perhaps it's time to think again. There is more to church than building, music and hypocrites.

Church is a family of people adopted by a loving God. Like all families, this one has problems and some fairly entrenched dysfunction, so don't be surprised when you find it isn't perfect. But its lack ot perfection means you don't need to worry that you will be the one to mess it up.

Church is made up of people from every nation on the globe. We are united by our faith in Jesus and we celebrate our diversity.

Church is for everyone and you are welcome! Let us show you what it means to belong. Let us convince you that real life can be found in a community of people looking to follow Jesus.

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And finally, the eight points from the Progressive Christianity Network Britain\*:

PCN Britain offers these eight points, not as a creed, but as an expression of the Christian life.

#### We are people who ....

- 1. Seek God, however understood, guided by the life and teachings of Jesus.
- 2. Affirm that there are many ways to experience the Sacred and that we can draw on diverse sources of wisdom on our spiritual journeys.
- 3. Recognise that following Jesus leads us to act with compassion and to confront evil.

- 4. Place hospitality at the centre of our communal and worshipping life and see the sharing of bread and wine as an expression of our common humanity.
- 5. Seek to build communities that accept all who wish to share companionship without insisting on conformity.
- 6. Know that the way we behave towards others is the fullest expression of our faith.
- 7. Gain more insights in the search for understanding than we do in certainty.
- 8. Work together within and beyond the Church to achieve a just, peaceful and sustainable world.
