In Flanders fields the poppies blow

Between the crosses, row on row

So begins John McCrae's poem. It was written in response to a friend's death in the Second Battle of Ypres in 1915. It was also the inspiration behind Moina Michael's campaign in 1918 for red poppies to be worn in remembrance in America which spread to the UK and was adopted by the British Legion.

Scarlet corn poppies grow naturally in conditions of disturbed earth throughout Western Europe. The destruction brought by the Napoleonic wars of the early 19th Century transformed bare land into fields of blood red poppies, growing around the bodies of the fallen soldiers. In late 1914, the fields of Northern France and Flanders were once again ripped open and again the poppy was one of the only plants to grow on the otherwise barren battlefields.

It was this image of poppies bursting forth in places of death and destruction that was the original inspiration for our annual wearing of them. To a greater or lesser extent, the emphasis has always been on those who died winning the conflict. It is a tradition that we have in common with the USA, Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

In contrast the equivalent to our marking of the Armistice in Germany is Volkstrauertag (German for "people's day of mourning"). It is a public holiday two Sundays before the first day of Advent. It commemorates members of the German armed forces and civilians who dies in armed conflicts, including victims of oppression.



Remembrance Sunday will always hold within it the tensions of violence and peace, courage and duty, horror and regret, victory and defeat, and much more. It is an impossible balance to strike, but it is one we must strive to make.

The personal balance I try to make is to wear both a red and a white poppy. The white poppies were first introduced in the 1930s to remember all casualties of war including civilians, and non-British casualties, to stand for peace, and not to glamorize war.

This Remembrance we will seek to honour those who died and to pray and act for peace.



If you have any donations of items suitable for the stalls please let the stallholders have them in advance. (Attached poster with more information).


Thurrock Foodbank


