Harvest Thanks



How we engage with Harvest Festivals has changed over the years in response to our relationship with the land. Before the rise of intensive and global farming, which has made food cheap and plentiful for us, we had a

much closer relationship to our food. Now our food is uniform, plastic wrapped, washed and may have travelled further than we ever have to reach the supermarket shelf. Some of us may remember a time when a large proportion of the population worked on the land and you knew the name of your grocer, but now much of the work is done by machines and the contents of the shelves determined by accountants.

The tradition of Harvest is fundamental to our culture and to the culture of the Bible. Soil was prepared, seeds planted, crops tended and harvests gathered, all trusting in God that the land would produce enough to support us. Each year when harvest was finished that trust was celebrated by giving thanks. We give thanks by bringing a portion of our Harvest and offering it back to God.

For us that used to mean digging up some crops from our gardens, allotments or fields, but now it just means buying something extra on a routine trip to the supermarket. The Harvest gifts used to be sold to raise funds, but now rather than being able to buy something different that a neighbour has produced we just have a different item someone else placed in a trolley. In many places sales of Harvest goods have died out because the excitement and novelty of the produce is no longer there. In response to this many congregations fall into our pattern of gathering non perishable goods for local food banks and taking up a collection for charity.

What we do at Harvest Festival had changed, but our reason for doing it remains. We could also argue that the change has been a beneficial one, as the gifts we share now directly support those that are in need. The reason we have Harvest festivals is to give thanks to our Creator God. We celebrate the beauty, wonder and generosity of Creation and give thanks that we are able to enjoy it. How we give thanks has changed, but not our reason for doing it.

Eastern Synod Faith in Action Forum Church in Society

Anne Barton, Facilities Manager, URC (as a member of the above Forum) has asked for the attached report to be included in Church Magazines

Of the Five Marks of Mission recognised by the URC three are concerned with action. These are:-

- (3) to respond to human need by loving service
- (4) to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind, and pursue peace and reconciliation.
- (5) to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

These are the issues addressed by the 'Faith in Action' group, on behalf of Eastern Synod. It is clear from these that the agenda of the group is wide-ranging and complicated and we may call upon the expertise of various members of the group to inform our reports to Synod. My special interest is with refugees and asylum seekers, which includes those who have been trafficked for sex or for labour. It is said that there is at least one brothel in every village, and in many streets in all towns. In these "establishments" there may be trafficked young people, some of them "minors", from Eastern Europe, Africa and Asia. There are very sad stories of young people being promised a good job here, only to find themselves being sold as slaves. If they do not speak English they may not know where they are and be terrified of their captors, so do not find escaping an There are various charities which help those who do manage to get away, such as Red Cross, Save the Children, the Salvation Army and Freedom from Torture. One of these, The Medaille Trust, has a specific role in providing "safe houses" where complex needs, including physical and psychological rehabilitation. are met in a safe, secret, caring Christian environment.

There are many ways in which we can help to tackle the scandal of modern slavery, including being alert to the problem, informing the police if we have suspicions, campaigning for an end to the demand for brothels, supporting agencies which work to end modern slavery in all its forms.

This is just one of the subjects on the ongoing agenda for the Faith in Action Forum. There is much to be done and many opportunities to make a difference. Study Groups

Don't forget that over the next month or so there is a chance to learn more about the happenings of World War 1 by coming along to the church on a Wednesday afternoon from 1pm – 2.30 pm

The first of three sessions commenced on the 12 September with a look behind the closed doors at the discussions being undertaken in the final weeks before the outbreak of war — "37 Days". The third session concludes on Wednesday 3rd October.

Then on Wednesday 10th October 1pm – 2.30 pm there is a chance to watch a film about the "The Last Day of World War One". It recounts the events and hours leading up to the last morning.

"The Passing Bells" Commences 31st October until 14th November on Wednesdays at 1 – 2.30 pm. These sessions will follow two teenage boys – one German and one British – who sign up to fight in WW1.

Each Session will involve watching a film followed by some discussion.




Grays United Reformed Church Bradleigh Avenue, RM17 5XD
