## **Marking the Seasons**

The first inklings of Spring seem to be with us. After a few false starts crocuses and daffodils are coming out in bloom, birds are beginning to build their nests, and on occasions there seems some heat in the sunshine. Each year follows this same cycle with the rebirth of Spring, the vitality of Summer, the rest of Autumn and the chill of Winter. As it is true for the year, it is also true for our lives.

It's hard to grasp this cycle in one view. The depth of Winter makes us doubt the heat of Summer. The excitement of Spring obscures the patience of Autumn. This has been true for humanity ever since we became conscious of the world around us, and why our ancestors created rituals to mark the seasons to offer hope of the next. Those rituals remain within our worshipping communities as we celebrate Easter, Ascension, Harvest and Christmas; and when we come together for baptisms, weddings, anniversaries and funerals.

In Spring and Summer, and during our childhood and youth, we focus on the overwhelming positives but they are not without risk and uncertainty. In Autumn and Winter, and during our later years, we focus on the drawbacks and negatives, but they are not without joys and benefits. The year and our lives rely on this cycle and each stage depends upon the others. Their challenge to us is to live fully each moment, whatever stage we are in, holding all that has gone before and looking forward to what is to be. The hope of Spring helps us through Winter, and the joy of Summer needs to include preparation for Autumn.

Within the Easter story we see this cycle lived out. The Autumn of Jesus' arrest, the Winter of his death on a cross, the Spring of Resurrection, and the Summer of the new life in Christ, the disciples, and we, share. As in our lives and the year, the cycle of the Easter story must be held together. Each part relies on every other, and its meaning is revealed to us as we reflect on the whole story as we journey through it together in worship.

Some thoughts from Rev'd David Coaker

### The Retreat

Early in February, Dave and seven members "retreated" for a day to Mulberry House at High Ongar. The retreat was, like Grays URC, a place to pause and also to give time to God.

Mulberry House is part of the Nationwide Christian Trust and is located in a cottage within the grounds of a hotel. Those grounds and the hotel were made available to us during the day. Inside the hotel we could use a library and a lounge. We also partook of a very tasty lunch in an attached garden room. The grounds were extensive and we could roam around a large pond on which we were surprised to come upon a family of Black Swans, mum, dad and three cygnets. In a nearby enclosure were several donkeys, which were quite amenable to being stroked and a number of alpacas, which weren't! In fact the Alpacas were described as haughty and Elaine reports that once they had established that she had not come bearing food, they turned their backs on her. How uncooperative!

Dave, in the meantime, was busy in the library, making use of the quietness of those surroundings.



The afternoon followed a similar pattern including afternoon teas and coffees and ending with another short service where people were invited to share their thoughts about the day.





# Promoting safe and healthy practices with Oral Rehydration Salts in India

In Madhya Pradesh – large state in central India – local government bodies help to spread information on diarrhea management and promoting safe and healthy practices to address under nutrition.

Dr Vandana Bhatia is a Unicef Health Specialist who has come to visit a programme there. She is explaining to health workers and mothers about the use of Oral Rehydration Salts as part of a intensified diarrhea control over a fortnight.



Here, Usha Sen is with her daughter baby Niharika who is 12 months old and drinking Oral Rehydration Salts, which are recommended by the World Health Organisation. This mother can now give her child freshly prepared ORS, which she learned from a Unicef supported health worker.



Grandmother Vasu and her grandson Sanket at the Child Health Centre in Kolar, adhya Pradesh. Sanket is having Oral Rehydration Therapy following a demonstration with Vasu.
