Discerning the Spirit

The Spirit of God is an incredibly powerful force, but we limit the possibilities if we only think of it as the spectacular. If we only think of the Holy Spirit in terms of dramatic events, and the purview of the charismatic and Pentecostal traditions and movements within the Church – we are denying the awesomeness contained within the gift of life we too often take for granted.

The Spirit of God is alive and well, we just need to be reminded of our complete reliance upon it and be open to letting ourselves be overwhelmed by it. This is true in our daily lives, our worship lives, and also when we gather as church meeting.

In our tradition we stridently declare that we gather in council together to discern the will of God. We are not a democracy. We are not trying to get our own way. We are placing ourselves before God, and each other, to listen for where God's Spirit is urging us towards.

Archbishop William Temple said: "The Church is the only institution that exists primarily for the benefit of those who are not its members." We not only exist for other people; we exist to serve the will of God. This is both an awesome privilege and responsibility.

In our Bible study on Isaiah 6 we explored the challenge of God's judgement and were given the example from a sermon on the book of Hebrews by Dr. Fred Craddock who 'alluded to the vinedresser of John 15. ... going into the vineyard with a big, curved pruning knife. Sometimes he would cut off branches that were unfruitful and without value. At other times, he would prune parts of the vine so that the branch could grow better and be more fruitful. "Now, the vine doesn't know if it is being cut off and discarded because it is fruitless, or if it is being cut in an effort to prune it and make it more fruitful. In either case, the knife feels the same."

Discerning the will of God, truly being Church, does require thinking and acting selflessly. Sometimes it will require us to stop doing things that we personally value, to start doing things that other people seem to appreciate, to alter our priorities, reapply our energies and resources and alter our mind set to give expression to where we think the Spirit is leading us.

The fundamental realisation within all this is that we are not relying upon ourselves, we are relying upon God. Sometimes the most faithful thing to do is to just stop. To put down all of the activity that can fill church life up and just embrace the silence of God and be open to taking a step of faith.

Some of the most dramatic changes in direction come in the face of endings. Before I came alongside them, one of my first churches got to the verge of closure. They were down to a handful of people and a building that was an overwhelming burden. They are now a small but vibrant congregation engaged with their community in a small building provided by a developer who built houses on the rest of their original site.

It is a source of great sadness that many congregations do not face impending challenges before they are overwhelming:

- The hurried merging of traditions when a roof collapses, is the worst way to start an ecumenical project seeking to better express the unity and vision of Christ.
- Waiting for a final funeral before just putting a building up for sale and the money being absorbed into an already wealthy Synod trust.
- The cobbling together of multiple congregations into pastorates to try to appease unachievable and contradictory expectations of ministers and being church.

The best time to grab the nettle and engage with the reality before you is always 5 or 10 years ago. The second best time, is now. Who knows where we will be next year or in five years' time? We are called to be faithful, and we are faithful by listening out for God's word to us, being open to the Spirit and following Christ's way within it all. We know we face challenges. We know we have a variety of views and expectations. We know we are called to be Church, to seek God's will and serve the community around us. We know all this. Now we need to find ways to attentively and respectfully listen to each other, discern God's Spirit, and together step out in faith wherever that may lead us.

What we do in Bible Study

Line 1 = a single word that is the subject of the poem

Line 2 = two adjectives describing the subject

Line 3 = three action words related to the subject

Line 4 = four feeling words related to the subject

Line 5 = a single word that acts as the conclusion or summary

Instead of staying for about half an hour I stayed a good bit longer intrigued with the whole afternoon.


Denise and her "gang" deserve a medal – they certainly, apart from being exhausted at the end of the afternoon, must feel quite fulfilled.

Winchester Cathedral

The holiday season is here again and thoughts are being given to which places of interest might be visited during a summer break. Janet and I will often seek out the nearest of our great cathedrals for such a visit and have not been disappointed yet.



Recently, we visited Winchester Cathedral (not our first visit there) to remind ourselves of some of the treasures it has to offer. This time we joined an organised tour but later we browsed on our own.

I think the most interesting aspect was the fact that the cathedral once nearly

collapsed. In the early 1900s it was realised that its foundations were waterlogged and needed underpinning. Early efforts failed to achieve this. The trenches dug by the architect simply filled with water and could not be pumped out. They had to be about 14 feet below the water table.

The solution was to bring in a naval trained deep sea diver. An experienced diver working at Portsmouth dockyard was assigned the unenviable task. His name was William Walker. From 1906, William Walker, with only one or two assistants on the surface, worked under water below the cathedral for six hours a day with very few breaks. He was sometimes 20 feet down, in total darkness, working in muddied water and using his bare hands.



He laboured at this task for no less than six years, excavating the trenches and filling them with bags of concrete. On completion of his work all the groundwater could be pumped out and the subsiding walls further underpinned by bricklayers. It is said of him that he saved the cathedral with his bare hands.

Walker was honoured for his outstanding work. A special service of thanksgiving was held in 1912 when Walker was presented to King George V and Queen Mary. He was made a member of the Royal Victorian Order. He unfortunately died aged just 49 during the epidemic of Spanish flu.

There is a larger than life size bust of Mr. Walker outside the cathedral.

What else has this cathedral to offer visitors?

Whilst visiting this cathedral one can meditate at three memorials to the author Jane Austen who lived in Hampshire. Her novels were hardly recognised until after her death.

Jane became ill at her home and moved to Winchester in order to consult an eminent doctor. But her illness progressed so rapidly that it was too late. She died on 18th July 1819 and was buried in the cathedral, which she greatly admired, in the early morning before services began. Sadly, only four people attended her funeral.

You will have heard of the legend of St. Swithun's day. In about 963, Swithun was chosen as the Patron Saint of the cathedral after having been Bishop of Winchester for ten years. His remains rest in the cathedral. His death gave rise to the legend that if it rains on 15th July it will rain for the next 40 days. Meteorologically speaking, the legend has proved to have no basis in fact!

There is a 'Fisherman's Chapel' within the building, following the burial there of Izaak Walton, (*The Compleat Angler*). This chapel, with its stained glass window, showing the renowned angler seated with his fishing rod, reading, is visited by anglers from all over the world.



Finally, (but not finally at all because there is much else to see!) one can visit the crypt. This is a somewhat bare place but brought into prominence by a statue of a life size man. It is by Anthony Gormley and represents a man contemplating water cupped in both hands. It is life size because although it is made of lead, it was from a plaster

cast of the artist's own body. Since the crypt gets inundated during rainy weather, the statue is sometimes up to its knees in water.



Desert Island Discs

I wasn't too sure when I wrote about what one of my choices of music might be if I was marooned on a desert island awaiting rescuing whether anyone one would be prepared to share their choice of music in such a situation. Remember you are only allowed eight records to take with you.

However, I am pleased to say that Alan Beckley, who admits to being a long time listener of the programme, has given us the list of pieces he would choose.



Alan says "I have selected four classical pieces and four more modern pieces. A rather eclectic mix, but all hold special memories, and in no particular order they are:-

- 1. "Nimrod" from Elgar's Enigma Variations (the version written for the organ if possible)
- 2. Widor's Toccata
- 3. "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's Messiah
- 4. "Ode to Joy" from Beethoven's 9th Symphony
- 5. "Mandolin Wind" by Rod Stewart (Denise and I saw Rod and the Faces in concert a few times back in the early 70's).
- 6. "Rocket Man" by Elton John.
- 7. "American Pie" by Don McLean (full length 7+ minute version please).
- 8. "Angie" by the Rolling Stones

In true "Desert Island Disc" style if asked to choose just one piece that depends.

I would love to hear other people's selection, so get thinking, it's quite good fun!"
