When faced with times of crisis or challenge, many turn to self-help for support. But what about Christians -how can we find strength not merely in self-help but in God's help?


A Way through the Wilderness is a five-session course which explores God's promise to comfort us we they struggle through life's wildernesses.

Standing in Solidarity

It feels quite trite writing a newsletter piece focussing on the events in Ukraine. To form words for our fellowship grounded in the horrors that are being faced by millions. It also feels hypocritical that a war on the edge of Europe has so much greater affect than those currently being fought in Afghanistan, Yemen, Tigray, Syria, and in too many other places.

Yet it is human nature that there are degrees to our empathy. We also relate more when it touches on aspects of our history that we absorb into our national identity. WWII, even though it is a lived memory for ever fewer of us, is the default source of similes and metaphors for much of our national debate. Along with the end of the Cold War we all felt that war in Europe was a thing of the past. Our memories and attentions are too short. Sadly, what is unfolding in Ukraine today has been years and decades in the making. Sanctions and aid are now being

decades in the making. Sanctions and aid are now being raised, but it is far too easy to see the steps Putin has taken along the way to this point. Our politicians, informed to an extent by the public opinion in which we play a part, have not been willing to make the hard choices to deter Putin's aggression. Choices which would also affect our way of life and security. Alliances, nuclear weapons, and the globalisation of trade, finance and migration compound the complexities.

Imposing sanctions and supplying aid are not without cost to us, but our discomfort bears no relation to the distress and disaster being faced by the Ukrainian people. Calmly bearing them, along with the existing rises in energy costs and the cost of living, is something we can do in solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Ukraine in this time.

How childhood memories stay with us

As a child I went to Sunday school. If you still attended when you were 12 you were given a Bible. There were 3 of us that got our Bibles at Christmas time 1956. We were all given a verse to learn and recite on receiving our Bibles. My mother wrote my verse in my Bible, so it has stayed with me through the years and I often come back to it.

So here it comes in Swedish:

"Många röster skall du höra, som ej komma från din Gud. Mången ton skall nå ditt öra av förakt för Herrens bud. Men den gode herde rösten som du hört i livets vår. Må den intill levnads hösten, bli din ledning vart du går."

In free English translation it means:

"You will hear many voices that are not from your God. Many words will reach your ear of contempt for God's commandments, but the voice of the good shepherd, that you heard in your youth, may it still be your guide in the autumn of your life."



How we understand and picture God change through life, and mine is certainly different now from when I was a 12-year-old girl. However, I still try to listen out for that voice that so easily get drowned in the everyday noise of living.

The inscription in my Bible from the Sunday school is from Psalm 121:5: "The Lord will guard you, he is by your side to protect you".

Very comforting words.

Grays URC South Essex Area Partnership Report

For Lent we are studying 'A way through the Wilderness' by Paula Gooder on Wednesday afternoons and having weekly 9.30am young families' services on Sundays exploring different characters in the Lent / Easter story. Parade services have been re-established. We've started a monthly dementia friendly service on Wednesdays, and are considering whether to reintroduce our monthly Sunday evening service.

The visit from Tilbury Band in December was cut short – just as the blessing was shared prior to the interval a main fuse blew! This has been remedied, and in response to this the Band would like to come again in July for an additional concert. (We're considering whether to make this our celebration of the URC's 50th anniversary.)

7th Grays Scouts – it appears that, unbeknownst to everyone involved, the sponsored status of the group ceased in 1949. This possibly coincided with us not having a permanent building due to the church suffering bomb damage during the war. A new agreement is being drafted.

We were startled by a hefty gas bill in February (mainly due to increased unit costs) and have taken initial steps to mitigate the costs going forward and will review their effect and explore other options, if necessary, before next winter.

We are delighted that in the coming weeks we will welcome two people into membership.

Our Annual Church Meeting will be on the 24th April and prior to that an informal meeting of those willing to serve on the elders' meeting will talk through ways of working to bring proposals to the ACM.

Isaiah 40 (NIV (Anglicised, 2011))

Throughout Lent we will be reflecting on this passage:

Comfort for God's people

40 Comfort, comfort my people, says your God. ² Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her hard service has been completed, that her sin has been paid for, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins.

³ A voice of one calling: 'In the wilderness prepare the way for the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. ⁴ Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain. ⁵ And the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the Lord has spoken.'

⁶ A voice says, 'Cry out.' And I said, 'What shall I cry?' 'All people are like grass, and all their faithfulness is like the flowers of the field.

⁷ The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the Lord blows on them. Surely the people are grass. ⁸ The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures for ever.'

⁹ You who bring good news to Zion, go up on a high mountain. You who bring good news to Jerusalem, lift up your voice with a shout, lift it up, do not be afraid; say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God!' ¹⁰ See, the Sovereign Lord comes with power, and he rules with a mighty arm. See, his reward is with him, and his recompense accompanies him.

¹¹ He tends his flock like a shepherd: he gathers the lambs in his arms and carries them close to his heart; he gently leads those that have young. ¹² Who has measured the waters in the hollow of his hand, or with the breadth of his hand marked off the heavens? Who has held the dust of the earth in a basket, or weighed the mountains on the scales and the hills in a balance? ¹³ Who can fathom the Spirit of the Lord, or instruct the Lord as his counsellor? ¹⁴ Whom did the Lord consult to enlighten him, and who taught him the right way? Who was it that taught him knowledge, or showed him the path of understanding?

¹⁵ Surely the nations are like a drop in a bucket; they are regarded as dust on the scales; he weighs the islands as though they were fine

dust. ¹⁶ Lebanon is not sufficient for altar fires, nor its animals enough for burnt offerings. ¹⁷ Before him all the nations are as nothing; they are regarded by him as worthless and less than nothing.

¹⁸ With whom, then, will you compare God? To what image will you liken him? ¹⁹ As for an idol, a metalworker casts it, and a goldsmith overlays it with gold and fashions silver chains for it.

²⁰ A person too poor to present such an offering selects wood that will not rot; they look for a skilled worker to set up an idol that will not topple. ²¹ Do you not know? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood since the earth was founded? ²² He sits enthroned above the circle of the earth, and its people are like grasshoppers. He stretches out the heavens like a canopy, and spreads them out like a tent to live in. ²³ He brings princes to naught and reduces the rulers of this world to nothing.

²⁴ No sooner are they planted, no sooner are they sown, no sooner do they take root in the ground, than he blows on them and they wither, and a whirlwind sweeps them away like chaff. ²⁵ 'To whom will you compare me? Or who is my equal?' says the Holy One. ²⁶ Lift up your eyes and look to the heavens: who created all these? He who brings out the starry host one by one and calls forth each of them by name. Because of his great power and mighty strength, not one of them is missing.

²⁷ Why do you complain, Jacob? Why do you say, Israel, 'My way is hidden from the Lord; my cause is disregarded by my God'? ²⁸ Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting

God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. ²⁹ He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. ³⁰ Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; ³¹ but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.





Over the past weeks it has been great to have been involved with people from different backgrounds, all with the aim of ending the need for a reliance on Foodbanks. It is promising and encouraging to

see such proactive conversations taking place and a number of key themes are being worked through:

- The root causes that drive people into debt (such as the five week wait for Universal Credit, which often leaves people with no option but to take an Advance Payment) need to be addressed.
- The principles of clarity, flexibility and respect need to be embedded across different government departments to better support people and inform them of the options available to them.
- There's a real need to strengthen the social security system to ensure support offered to people is in line with the real cost of living, so everyone can afford the essentials and the risk of people in hardship being pushed into debt is reduced.

It is clear that this will not happen overnight, but it is encouraging to hear these conversations are starting to happen.

We are now fully engaged with the Trussell Trust planning our future structure as we go forward, please keep an eye open for invitations to some information sessions. Please continue to pray for wisdom and guidance as we plan for the future of Thurrock Foodbank.

Unfortunately demand still remains 12% up on pre-pandemic levels, so demand high with an increasing number coming to us for help for the first time. This is hitting our stock levels on certain products:

Committed to supporting our global partners in:

ZIMBABWE

Zimbabwe faces unprecedented economic challenges following COVID. However, our partners speak often of just how important our presence is among some of the poorest communities, and they are grateful for your ongoing support.

Here are some numbers for those of you who like statistics. Christian Aid's BRACT Project aims to improve the capacity of 29 targeted communities (the Mutoko and Mudzi wards in the Eastern Highlands). This equates to some 41,230 households (3,365 directly). The aim is to anticipate, prepare, and respond to various kinds of shocks in order to maintain productive capacity. In addition, we aim to develop diversified, viable livelihood options. This means that we enable about 12 140 households to adapt to the growing number of climate and socio-economic stresses. We also aim to strengthen the voice of exploited community, so that they exercise their voices with service providers.

But stats can sometimes hide the enormous impact that ordinary generosity makes on the lives of ordinary people! So please do continue to pray and act on behalf of our wonderful friends in Zimbabwe through Commitment for Life.

BANGLADESH

Angela Biswas writes: "Each morning I wake up with the clucks of my hens. I was able to build up my poultry farm with the support of Christian Aid Bangladesh which gave me a hope to stand strong despite my poverty. It allowed me to make a handsome amount of savings." Thank you for your support for our work in Bangladesh. What an enormous difference it makes!

EL SALVADOR

"Summers are very dry here. We planted vegetables in January and February; the weather was very hot, and it didn't work. Now we have changed the sowing dates, and production has improved." Milagro del Carmen Moreira, a sweet chilli farmer in the El Brazo Canton.

This pilot project supported by Christian Aid with financial help from Commitment for Life helped mainly women to produce sweet chillies in a mesh house (similar to a greenhouse).

One of the major challenges is to enable women to make it possible for other women to become involved in the project, so that they too can share their knowledge in order to form networks. This builds in the capacity for resilience towards climate and economic shocks.

Economic resilience is also a bulwark against migration, which is so very disruptive for communities, with often the most skilled people leaving the area and so entrenching poverty even further. Thanks to your support, these projects are made possible. We have made a difference in the lives of some of the poorest people in Central America.

Prayer Time

Jesus, you declared a New Jubilee at the very start of your ministry, a promise to cancel all debt demanded by the rich. And then you overturned the tables of unjust economic structures. Praise be to God! Help us, Jesus, to follow in your footsteps. Give us the wisdom. tools, and courage to subvert the deeply unjust economic structures of empire in our day, and in so doing, to usher in the kin-dom of God. In your name we pray. Amen.



Financial Report Mar 2022

As I have yet to receive the February bank statement, I do not know the exact bank balance at present. According to my calculations, it is between £19,000 and £20,000, which is above my preferred minimum, despite a hefty gas bill for January.

Also, I have just sent a cheque for nearly £5,000 for the premises insurance for the coming year, making the true bank balance around £15,000.

It was decided at CM not to increase our hirers rents for 2022, in spite of a hefty rise in energy costs, particularly gas prices.

The rise in energy costs is proving to be a challenge, trying to keep our premises at a reasonable temperature whilst keeping some sort of control of our energy bills. Although warmer weather is just around the corner, (we hope), we will face a similar challenge next winter.

High energy costs will continue to put a strain on our finances, and doubtless there will be more essential works to be carried out in the future, involving unforeseen expense.

At the moment I am working with our book-keepers to prepare the year end accounts for 2021, and have arrange to have the accounts audited at the end of March.

I think that is all for now, other than the usual thanks to those who contribute so generously to Church funds each month, to Alf and Bob for any help required, Charlotte for organising the lettings and Elaine for the invoicing.

If anyone has a query regarding Church finances, please contact me and I will do my best to help.
