This month also marks the first anniversary of our community café. Our thanks to all who have supported it, in a whole host of ways, and we may even add a candle to the cake we offer on the 14<sup>th</sup>!

As you know, last month I was appointed Synod Clerk and the Moderator in her announcement asked for prayer and patience. Thank you especially for yours, as I navigate these new waters and seek to balance the demands of both of these roles.

### Guest Speaker from Guide Dogs

Our Church has been pursuing the possibility of becoming a Sight Loss Friendly Church and was pleased to welcome Chris and Mick Bennett with his assistant dog, Usher, to our service on the 7 August.

At the beginning of Mick's sight loss journey, he was in a difficult place in his life and not able to come to terms with losing his sight. He began to lose confidence in himself. About 5 years ago, Mick's life started to turn around. He was paired with Usher, a wonderful assistant dog from Guide Dogs. This was the start of their wonderful adventure together. This has helped Mick to gain back full independence and confidence to live life without sight.

Chris and Mick Bennett, with his assistant dog Usher from Guide Dogs, visited us in August, and during a Sunday service, gave a talk on Mick's sight loss journey. At the beginning of this journey, he was at a difficult place in his life, and not able to come to terms with losing his sight. About 5 years ago, however, Mick's life started to turn around when he was paired with Usher his wonderful assistant dog.

Mick has done several fundraising events for the Guide Dogs charity, such as tandem parachute jump, zip wiring down a quarry and wing walking while strapped to the top of a biplane. Usher is always with Mick, and he watches from a distance, with Chris.

His next fundraising is a 'blind drive'. He will be driving a James Bond Aston Martin DB9 car in August. Yes, he will be driving blind at full speed with sighted assistance, to fulfil one of his lists of amazing achievements.

Chris is a self-published author and has written 2 books about Mick's experiences with his guide dog. The books are called; "Usher You're A Star' and 'Usher our Cruising Star'. Yes, Usher had been on a cruise with Mick and Chris where he also met the ship's captain.

#### From Ministries & Mission

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends, Is anyone back to normal?

After two years of pandemic and lockdown, and Covid still with us (thankfully, for most, in a much weaker form), we can now worship together in person and find fellowship again. But for most of us it is not simply a return to how it used to be; some people have not returned to church, some have died or become too frail, some churches have closed and others considering it.

Now we have significant European turmoil and its likely effect on fuel and food prices for us in the UK.

Thank God that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13 v.8). Whatever else changes, He is our rock, our cornerstone.

Financially, things were extremely tough for churches in 2021. Plate offerings had collapsed; some regular givers had to reduce or entirely stop giving to support God's work; and those churches which hire out their premises had seen income from that source disappear. Even those churches where the majority of the giving was by standing order or bank transfer (if you have not considered regularising your giving in this way, please do - it helps your treasurer significantly) may have seen a 20%+ drop in income.

If this had been replicated in giving to the M&M Fund in 2021, we might have been faced with a serious financial crisis last year.

But no, through the generosity of individuals, churches and Synods, we can report that income only fell by 4.4%. With a similar reduction in expenditure the M&M Fund result was a deficit of only £80,000

(less than one-half of one percent of income), a deficit that can be comfortably covered by reserves.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2021 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With churches and individuals under financial pressure, 2022 is not going to be an easy year either. The M&M Fund budgeted income (based on Synods' projections) will not be sufficient to cover expected costs and we are reconciled to dipping into our reserves more seriously as a result.

However, if we "ordinary Christians" are to fulfil the call of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world around us we need ministers and other workers "on the ground" and we need shared resources which are often best created centrally. That all comes from the M&M Fund.

Again, thank you all!

#### Financial Update August 2022

As of 31 July the bank balance stood at a little over £21,000, comfortably above my preferred minimum balance. As always though, we never know what unforeseen expenses are around the corner, not to mention some hefty heating bills in the coming winter.

Synod has agreed our compromise M & M figure of £23,500 per annum as discussed at Church Meeting. They also noted our willingness to make up the difference to the original figure of £24,948, should the 25% Synod rebate be approved later in the year, and subject to approval of church meeting. Otherwise things are quite stable financially at the moment.

Printed elsewhere in Silent Visitor is a letter from the Synod Treasurers which explains amongst other things, the effect of Covid on the URC finances. Please spend five minutes reading it, thank you.

I think that is all for now, other than the usual thanks to those who contribute so generously to Church funds each month, to Alf and Bob for any help required, to Charlotte for organising the lettings and Elaine for the invoicing.

If anyone has a query regarding Church finances please contact me and I will do my best to help.

Grays URC are in receipt of weekly news reports from Peter Newall, Operations Manager at Thurrock Food-bank.

The "Weekly Wire" provides information of how things are at the Food-bank and of any special events. An example being when they were presented with a cheque for £1,000 from the Griffin Foundation and then after they had shown them around the Food-bank, they decided to double their donation to £2,000! That was certainly very generous

# Another Cathedra

ELY

This year gave us an opportunity to visit two more cathedrals, Ely and Peterborough. The latter will feature in the next edition of SV.

Previously we had made two attempts to visit Ely to no avail. This time we were successful and made our visit accompanied by two previous members of this church, Claire and Stanley Trencher, on a very wet afternoon.



A cathedral of the Fenlands, Ely rises visually from the flat expanses of the Cambridgeshire fens. Although its diocese is centred in Cambridge, it also includes some small parts of

Bedfordshire, Essex, Norfolk and Peterborough.

It was in 675 that a 33 year old princess, Ethelreda by name, here founded a double monastery for both nuns and monks. 400 years or so later, this was where Hereward the Wake made his stand against the Normans.

The present building was started in 1083 and was mostly completed by 1189, although a number of major improvements were added later. Two of these are quite singular. One is the

ceiling of the nave, made of wood and painted (free of charge by two Victorian artists) in the nineteenth century. This nave is exceptionally long -246 feet, one of the longest in the UK.

The other architectural feature mentioned is an octagonal 'lantern' topping a tower. In 1322, the square Norman central tower collapsed. It had been built on unstable ground. Local people thought it was an earthquake! It was decided to replace it by a lighter structure. The result was an octagonal tower rising from a wooden vault. On the top was an octagonal lantern, over 60 feet high. It is difficult to show this in a photograph so to get the full effect a visit is recommended.

One further feature worth mentioning is a Victorian unicursal maze (a maze you can only walk one way – not a lot of people know that!) It is on the floor at the West entrance and the distance from the start to the centre is the same as the height of the tower above it. Before we left, our friend Stanley walked the maze!

#### A British Icon

"Psst – wanna buy a phone box? I can get you one for a quid!" Thus might have been the words of Private Walker, the lovable "spiv" of 'Dad's Army'.

The red telephone box is now recognised as a British icon. It was designed by Sir Charles Gilbert Scott and was launched in 1936 to celebrate King George V's silver jubilee. It soon became a familiar sight, not only on the streets of the U.K. but also on those of Malta, Bermuda and Gibraltar. Whilst its normal colour was bright red, to make it visible, the Post Office, the then proprietor, was forced into allowing a less strident grey for areas of natural and architectural beauty. Ironically, some of those areas which have preserved their telephone boxes, have now painted them red! Today they may be contracted to purchase from BT for the consideration of £1. You may now come across such preserved icons in many places throughout the country.

One such became of particular interest to Janet and myself. It is located in the small village and civil parish of Postling, in Kent, within a couple of miles of the M20 motorway. Postling is mentioned in the Domesday Book as being part of the lands of one Hugo de Montfort. It is within an area of outstanding natural beauty. To those of us who hail from industrial urban areas, this terrestrial paradise is a stark contrast to 'those dark satanic mills'. Our particular interest is that within Postling is a small caravan site, licensed by the Caravan and Motor-home Club to take up to five caravans or motor-homes. The site is owned by sheep farmers Mr and Mrs Hobbs. They both sit on the Parish Council, Mr Hobbs being the chairman. So both have been instrumental in organising the refurbishment of the local telephone box. Rather than housing a public telephone, it has now become a point of interest displaying details of the history of Postling, very professionally set out on a typical English Heritage style tablet. The sign, 'Telephone', normally displayed below the roof line, has now given way to 'POSTLING'. It may have been acquired for £1, but the refurbishment costs have run into four figures.

One of the meanings of 'heritage' is, 'valued objects and qualities that may be passed down from previous generations, especially relating to things of special architectural or historical value that may be preserved for the nation'. It also includes, 'features belonging to the culture of a particular society, e.g. buildings, which come from the past and are still historically important'. On that basis, the Parish of Postling can be said to valued contribution have made а to our heritage. notwithstanding that it has never contained a shop nor a pub! (See photograph below of the Postling box in its relation to the Parish Church).

#### AN EMERGING DEBT CRISIS IN PALESTINE & ISRAEL

Debt is strangling the poorest people in Palestine and Israel, and in any sane world would immediately be cancelled. ISRAEL'S national debt is around US\$208 billion. That equates to 66% of GDP or US\$24 000 per citizen. Each year \$US9 billion is added to the bill.

Palestine's debt to GDP ratio has exceeded 63% - well over the 40% limit set in law. The Palestinian Authority's ability to service that debt is hampered by the illegal occupation and oppression of its people. For both Israel and Palestine, there is an emerging debt crisis that will affect the poorest citizens enormously, brought about by a deeply problematic global financial and economic architecture.

In fact, the global financial system beggars belief. Take the British foreign aid budget. The majority goes not to poor people but to a colonial-era investment firm called CDC that invests in luxury hotels, malls, and restaurant chains. In the end, only 3% of this aid goes to suppliers in the global south, with over 90% being paid to British firms. "This is the real scandal," says economist Jason Hickel. "Aid money is taken from the pockets of British taxpayers and sent straight into the already-gilded coffers of the British business elite. It's a shameful abuse of our most compassionate impulse," he concludes.

Together with Global Justice Now, Commitment for Life works to cancel the debt of the highly exploited nations. Thank you for all you do to bring about justice in our world through effective debt cancellation.






