Tribute to Bryan Overland as read by

Rev'd David Coaker at Bryan's funeral service

Bryan Overland 19/11/1935 - 20/12/2022

Bryan was the second son born, on 19th November 1935, to Thomas Charles Overland and Annie Rhodes Wild who lived at 45 Rectory Road in Grays.

He attended Little Thurrock St Mary's Church School on Dock Road.

Growing up during the 2nd World War was not an uneventful childhood, notably escaping death aged 9 whilst playing with two friends when a doodle bug killed his friend Reggie near the family home.

He later attended Palmer's School, leaving aged 16 and his employment at Thames Board Mills commenced on 31st December, where he was employed for all his working life, excepting a two-year break to carry out compulsory National Service.

Bryan served his National Service in the Royal Air Force, mainly on Radar Stations in Germany.

He married Maureen (having met at 'dancing classes' at St. John's Hall, College Road), in 1959 at St. Mary's North Stafford and celebrated their reception at The Acorn, in Stifford Clays.

Their family grew with the births of Susan and then Colin.

For nearly 4 years the family lived in Aveley Village, before returning to Grays.

Apart from the war years, Bryan enjoyed a very carefree childhood, playing in 'car free' roads and enjoying roller skating, cycling (a life-long interest), - and later on motor cycling and cars, music, reading, gardening, and the cinema.

Despite working hard - not such long holidays as nowadays there was always house maintenance, gardening and holidays to enjoy. After 42 years to the day, he began a long and busy retirement. After taking on two allotments Bryan was in great demand when elderly people needed help in their gardens (staying with some until they died). Bryan looked after the lawns, and garden here at the URC for 12 years, and helped with Squirrel Club (a Mother and Child Group) for 8 years. Such happy times for both Bryan and Maureen, and life-long friendships made.

Later helpers were needed at a Bowls Club for people in wheelchairs, and this led to more friendships, and also coming along to Art and Computer Classes.

Always a kind and loving husband, father, and helper to Maureen's parents.

Some memories and thoughts from friends linked with Grays URC:

Inger Collier:

Situations flash back in my memory: Bryan at the kitchen sink doing the washing up in church. In the service with a sleeping child in his arms, either a grandchild or Simon Whately.

Welcoming people for coffee in the garden at Tennyson Avenue.

Receiving the Christian Aid collections and counting the money, a very time-consuming task.

Bryan was not the complaining sort. We have missed him when he finally had to give up coming.

Pauline Whately:

I have been most grateful for both your mum and dad for the friendship over the years, especially during our time at Grays.

I will continue to be grateful for all their help with both my boys when they were small. I have told many people how they helped me when I was so far away from my parents. Thank you for sharing your mum and dad with me. George Semain:

It is not that easy to wax eloquent about Bryan because he was essentially a quiet and modest man. But he had hidden depths.

I had certain affinities with Bryan. For a start we both enjoyed cycling but I have to concede that he outlasted me in terms of how long he continued to ride.

He was discerning in his choice of bicycle whilst I knew him. He rode a Dawes bike, which in our time was considered quite an upmarket and relatively lightweight machine. It was even exhibited at the Festival of Britain in 1951 as the bike of the future. I think cycling was Bryan's preferred form of transport.

Bryan was the sort of man to be a true and loyal friend. He was very supportive.

When Janet and I sojourned at Orsett Church for a few years, Bryan made a point of supporting me whenever I was preaching or, together with Maureen, whenever I held a bible study.

We used to offer him a lift on those occasions which he always politely declined and proceeded to come by bicycle. He even did this after his stroke and many times we passed him on the way, toiling up the hill to Orsett. It became quite a difficult journey for him but Bryan was uncomplaining and always arrived in time, taking off his bicycle clips with a smile on his face.

We were of a similar age, Bryan having been born a few days after me. Had he not had to defer his call-up to the RAF we would most likely have been at the same square-bashing camp together. We also both served overseas but in different parts of the world.

Whenever we lose a friend like Bryan we always regret not having spent more time with them, something we all need to keep in mind whilst we can. It's part of our relationships with others. We don't get a second chance.

Financial Report February/March 2023

The bank balance as at 31^{st} January was £25,000. The gas bill for January was 'only' £1,623 for the church, partly due to an energy bill relief rebate of £420 from the government, and partly I feel from the revised worship arrangements on Sunday mornings. We also received government electricity rebate of £250, and a grant of nearly £2,400 from synod towards energy bills, which will be paid directly into our bank.

The bad news is that following a recent safety check on our building, electrical works totalling nearly \pounds 6,000 are required. Also, the building and contents insurance is due, the amount will again be around \pounds 6,000.

I have a meeting soon with our accountants to start preparing the year end accounts.

Cheques totalling £821 have been sent to our chosen charity for 2022, the Alzheimer's Society. This included 5% of the annual church weekly giving as agreed at Church Meeting and £150 collected in October 2022.

I think that is all for now, other than the usual thanks to those who contribute so generously to Church funds each month, to Alf and Bob for any help required, Charlotte for organising the lettings and Elaine for invoicing.

If anyone has a query regarding Church finances, please contact me and I will do my best to help.

Lent's a Time For Thinking



Sometimes we read our bible stories without giving them the thought they deserve. For instance we all know about the story of John the Baptist and his meeting with Jesus but what does it all make us think about?

Just recently we have seen a repeat of the television series, 'Keeping up Appearances'. One of these stories involved the 'lady of the house' dragging her long suffering husband from a stately home they were visiting, into the garden, as she had noticed the arrival of her sister and her underdressed husband also visiting the house. After her pretence that she was acquainted with the house owner she could not bear to be seen with her more honest but more poorly clad relatives.

Whilst hiding in the garden she is approached by someone she considers to be a gardener, complete with cloth cap, overalls and pruning shears. She continues with her pretence, which was of no avail when it transpired the 'gardener' was no other than his lordship the owner of the property. She, with her husband in tow, beats a hasty retreat. Why did this somehow make me think of John the Baptist and Jesus and Lent?

We have fixed in our minds what good leaders should look like. They are often tall, well dressed and speak with a refined accent. Nether John nor Jesus filled that bill. People might be forgiven for not recognising their importance and their status in their religion. Take John's statement in *1 John 26* - "Among you, though you do not know him, stands the one who is to come after me." Even John did not at first know fully who Jesus was but did so after witnessing the Spirit from heaven alighting on him. So, one thought for Lent might be, 'beware of false impressions'. Sometimes we don't give enough thought to the importance of John even though the gospels of Mark and John both start with the Baptist rather than with Jesus. We recognise that initially there might have been doubt in peoples' minds as to who was the more important but this firstly only shows itself because of John's insistence – "He must grow greater, I must become less" (John 3. 30) Perhaps another thought for Lent - let's embrace true humility and not keep putting ourselves first. Jesus also displays this by himself submitting to John for a baptism. Both of them challenge our assumptions about who seems great, John the raving prophet or Jesus the consistent law breaker.

The Herod kings were often called 'the great'. Herod Antipas didn't get the idea either. He was bloated by luxury and pride. He felt he could have what he wanted, including his brother's wife and even her daughter. It was this sort of corrupt thought that led to John's execution, even though Herod had shown a certain soft spot for John. Another Lenten thought - how much can power corrupt and what should we look for in our leaders. Is it their honest proposals for the good of their country or their likelihood of keeping their party in power, a party we might support?

Pilate was certainly powerful. He had the backing (at the time) of the Emperor. He could virtually do what he liked. But he always had his eye to the main chance. The Emperor would not be happy with a revolution starting in Jerusalem. Should he bow to the demands of the crowds egged on by the priests, priests whom he kept in power, or should he follow his conscience and let a man he was convinced was not guilty go free? Caiaphas was also powerful, subject to Pilate's availing him of the Chief Priesthood. He was a leader of religion. As such we might expect him to have the highest morality. But looking at the world's history, is that what our priestly leaders have shown? Some say that more wars have been started by religious differences than any other cause. So, another thought – can we honestly say we always have the sort of morality to make the right decisions in our lives, despite the effect on us?

Lastly, what about those we call the people. The whole mass of them, including the media. They often wield the greatest power, as Caiaphas and Pilate might confirm. How might we exercise that power? Is it through the ballot box, or mass meetings, or putting the wrong thoughts in peoples' minds, or blocking the traffic routes? There is a great responsibility here. We might also think about this during Lent. Let us never be amongst those who shout "Crucify Him!"
