We can then take a wider view and see what activities in our neighbourhood also express the Kingdom and then explore how we can encourage them. A wider view takes in our ecumenical neighbours to see how we can help each other, seeing what is possible rather than fixating on our differences. Still wider we can look to our fellow URCs and determine how we can share the resources we have to express our Reformed view of our faith. Working together is a practical but also a spiritual need, as together we discover the height, breadth and depth of the Kingdom.

To focus our worship on Sunday mornings by drawing together elements of the present 9.30am and 10.30am services to offer times of worship that are informal and formal in a sustainable and manageable way each week.

Elders' meeting on Wed 24th May reflected on the discussion at CM and shared an outline plan in June SV which was then discussed at an open meeting on Wed 28th June.

The following is the result of that discussion which elders will be looking to implement from September, with your help and support, and will be reviewed in November:

Pattern for our Sunday mornings:

9.30am Arrivals and non-specific activities for children

(i.e., a standard mix of activities each week)

9.45am Welcome – brief introduction to the week's theme

Activities - worksheet / craft

Story, songs, prayer

10.15am Refreshments

10.45am Quiet time – transition from informal to formal, for

those who came to the earlier worship to depart and those who came for refreshments to prepare for worship. Marked by a set piece of music.

10.50am Beginning of our more familiar worship service,

with its usual variations.

11.30am Final blessing and depart.

We will just have one time of worship for Parade services.

We will use the Daily Devotions material once per month.

We will source the Roots material.

We will invite other leaders of worship for our later time.

Whether we vary our pattern during school holidays or include café-style worship will be reviewed in 2024.

News from the Foodbank

The Thurrock Foodbank has been visited by local school pupils who will be joining them in some work experience.

Another school are discussing the work of Year 9. The First Give Programme is part of the curriculum all about raising awareness for social issues and involving pupils. The pupils are running a food drive for the foodbank, and will make it a competition among their groups to entice more pupils to participate. They will be creating posters, announcing in assembly and posting on the foodbank social media pages. The winning Charity will receive £1,000.

Recently the demand has increased with many centres seeing a reasonable dramatic increase. They still have lower stocks in various items. The items mainly are dessert related products and include:-

Custard, Tinned Fruit, Tinned potatoes, Mashed Potatoes, Cooking Sauces, Jams/spreads, Sponge Puddings/Angel Delights and Jellies, Long Life Milk.
