Of course, we will learn some lessons and explore new ideas along the way, but so far, so good. Let us give thanks to God for the new path we have stepped out in faith on.

Mite Scheme



The Mite Scheme raises funds by collecting 5p coins, to purchase Oral Rehydration Sachets through Unicef to keep children around the world healthy and safe. Just like your alka-seltzer after a party, these salts can re-hydrate your body. However, for a child suffering from cholera or malnutrition, five sachets could

mean the difference between life and death. Did you know that just £6 could save the lives of as many as 15 children suffering from dehydration caused by diarrhoea?

What difference will this make for children?

All money raised through the Scheme comes to Unicef. The delivery and production in various locations locally of each sachet, costs an average 8p.

Our fundraising goes to buy sachets of specially-formulated salts that can help save the lives of children suffering from

dehydration caused by diarrhoea.

How can we support the scheme?

On Sundays there is a tub placed on the table in the worship space to collect our coins, and Alf and Margaret count them up and pay the money to UNICEF.



Look forward to seeing you again soon.


Membership

MOVING STORIES

Committed to supporting our global partners in:

ISRAEL & OCCUPIED PALESTINE

On Saturday, 7 October, Hamas launched a wave of rocket attacks and stormed into Israel, leading to the biggest escalation in violence there has been in the region. Members of armed groups entered Israeli towns, communities, and military facilities near the Gaza Strip, killing and capturing Israeli forces and civilians.

William Bell, Christian Aid's Head of Middle East Policy & Advocacy, says, "Following atrocities against Israeli civilians, Israel's military response in Gaza is now creating an escalating humanitarian crisis that threatens more than two million people."

Christian Aid has been working with the poorest and most vulnerable people in the Middle East since the early 1950s, when it provided humanitarian relief to Palestinian refugees.

Christian Aid's established partners in Gaza are ready to respond with medical relief and community-led initiatives such as food, shelter, sanitation, and protection.

BANGLADESH

Rising temperatures and a longer monsoon season are providing ideal breeding conditions for mosquitoes. Bangladesh is grappling with record deaths of the Mosquito-borne dengue fever this year. Disease experts are linking worsening outbreaks to the impacts of climate change.

A lack of proper prevention measures has allowed the dengue carrying Aedes Aegypti mosquito to spread across almost all of Bangladesh.

Dengue is common during the June-September monsoon season when mosquitoes thrive in stagnant water.

Authorities are scrambling to contain and treat the disease. By August of 2023, 778 people had died so far in Bangladesh, making this the deadliest year since the first recorded epidemic in 2000.

ZIMBABWE

In the Mudzi District of Zimbabwe, our Commitment for Life partners work to support improved livestock production, managing and marketing.

Livestock such as cattle, goats, chickens, ducks and guinea fowl are incredibly valuable resources for communal farmers. Yet these resources suffer the impacts of climate change most acutely. Thanks to the education, training, and support that you enable through your support, local farmers are taught risk reduction techniques and financial literacy.

"[Our training...] covered goat production and management aspects such as improved housing, nutrition, and disease management.

"We are grateful for the improved knowledge," says communal farmer, Mr Never Kafura.

PRAYER

Creator God, we thank you for the creative thoughts and talents you have given each one of us. Help us to use those gifts in ways that express your sadness over global justice issues which affect people in regions such as Bangladesh, Zimbabwe and Israel and the occupied Palestinian territories. May our hearts be so moved that our response is simply to love and support these people, as you would, in the best way we can through Commitment for Life. Amen.
